## 1. Introduction and aims

At Oakwood Community School we recognise that mobile phones, including smart phones, are an important part of everyday life for our pupils, parents and staff, as well as the wider school community.

Our policy aims to:

- > Promote, and set an example for, safe and responsible phone use
- > Set clear guidelines for the use of mobile phones for pupils, staff, parents and volunteers
- > Support the school's other policies, especially those related to child protection and behaviour

This policy also aims to address some of the challenges posed by mobile phones in school, such as:

- > Risks to child protection
- > Data protection issues
- > Potential for lesson disruption
- > Risk of theft, loss, or damage
- > Appropriate use of technology in the classroom

## 2. Roles and responsibilities

#### 2.1 Staff

All staff (including teachers, support staff, and supply staff) are responsible for enforcing this policy.

Volunteers, or anyone else otherwise engaged by the school, must alert a member of staff if they witness, or are aware of, a breach of this policy.

The Head teacher and DSL are responsible for monitoring the policy every 2 years, reviewing it, and holding staff and pupils accountable for its implementation.

## 3. Use of mobile phones by staff

## 3.1 Personal mobile phones

Staff (including volunteers, contractors and anyone else otherwise engaged by the school) are not permitted to make or receive personal calls, or send texts, while children are present/during contact time. Use of personal mobile phones must be restricted to non-contact time, and to areas of the school where pupils are not present (such as the staff room).

There may be circumstances in which it's appropriate for a member of staff to have use of their phone during contact time. For instance:

> In the case of acutely ill dependents or family members

The headteacher will decide on a case-by-basis whether to allow for special arrangements.

If special arrangements are not deemed necessary, school staff can use the school office number 01455 273763 as a point of emergency contact.

#### 3.2 Data protection

Staff must not use their personal mobile phones to process personal data, or any other confidential school information.

#### 3.3 Safeguarding

Staff must refrain from giving their personal contact details to parents or pupils, including connecting through social media and messaging apps.

Staff must avoid publicising their contact details on any social media platform or website, to avoid unwanted contact by parents or pupils.

Staff must not use their mobile phones to take photographs or recordings of pupils, their work, or anything else which could identify a pupil. If it's necessary to take photos or recordings as part of a lesson/school trip/activity, this must be done using school equipment.

Any access to school emails, apps for Arbor, CPOMS etc should be completed through work appliances only – laptop, school mobile phone

### 3.4 Using personal mobiles for work purposes

In exceptional circumstances, it may be appropriate for staff to use personal mobile phones for work. Such circumstances may include, but aren't limited to:

- > Emergency evacuations
- > Supervising off-site trips
- > Supervising residential visits

However the school mobile phone should be used in the first instance.

### 3.5 Work phones

All members of staff are provided with a mobile phone by the school for work purposes.

#### Staff must:

- > Only use phone functions for work purposes, including making/receiving calls, sending/receiving emails or other communications, or using the internet
- > Ensure that communication or conduct linked to the device is appropriate and professional at all times, in line with our staff code of conduct.

#### 3.6 Sanctions

Staff that fail to adhere to this policy may face disciplinary action.

See the school's staff disciplinary policy for more information.

## 4. Use of mobile phones by pupils

Students are able to bring their phones to school as many students come a distance by taxi and they use these to entertain themselves whilst travelling.

On arrival students are asked to hand their phone into the staff on the gate and these are stored in a box in the Assistant Headteachers office.

Pupils are allowed to use their phones during the school day by prior agreement and this must be a sined agreement to the policy. The agreement is that pupils are allowed to use their phone for 10 mins of supervised use as a calming, reward strategy. This would be limited to a session at lunchtime, in the first instance..

Pupils must adhere to the school's Acceptable use agreement for mobile phone use (see appendix 1).

#### 4.1 Sanctions

If a student breaches this policy

- > Phones will be confiscated? (Schools are permitted to confiscate phones from pupils under sections 91 and 94 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006)
- > If a student's phone is confiscated the child's parent/carer will be contacted and informed that the confiscation has taken place. The phone will only be returned to the parent/carer when they come to school to collect it.

Staff will have the power to search pupils' phones, as set out in the <u>DfE's guidance on searching, screening and confiscation</u>. The DfE guidance allows school to search a pupil's phone if there is reason to believe the phone contains pornographic images, or if it is being/has been used to commit an offence or cause personal injury.

Certain types of conduct, bullying or harassment can be classified as criminal conduct. The school takes such conduct extremely seriously, and will involve the police or other agencies as appropriate.

Such conduct includes, but is not limited to:

- > Sexting (consensual and non-consensual sharing nude or semi-nude images or videos)
- > Upskirting
- > Threats of violence or assault
- > Abusive calls, emails, social media posts or texts directed at someone on the basis of someone's ethnicity, religious beliefs or sexual orientation

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# 5. Use of mobile phones by parents, volunteers and visitors

Parents, visitors and volunteers (including governors and contractors) must adhere to this policy as it relates to staff if they are on the school site during the school day.

This means:

> Not taking pictures or recordings of pupils, unless it's a public event (such as a school fair), or of their own child

- > Using any photographs or recordings for personal use only, and not posting on social media without consent
- > Not using phones in lessons, or when working with pupils

Parents, visitors and volunteers will be informed of the rules for mobile phone use when they sign in at reception or attend a public event at school.

Parents or volunteers supervising school trips or residential visits must not:

- > Use their phone to make contact with other parents
- > Take photos or recordings of pupils, their work, or anything else which could identify a pupil

Parents or volunteers supervising trips are also responsible for enforcing the school's policy for pupils using their phones, as set out in section 4 above.

Parents must use the school office as the first point of contact if they need to get in touch with their child during the school day. They must not try to contact their child on his/her personal mobile during the school day.

## 6. Loss, theft or damage

Pupils bringing phones to school must ensure that phones are handed to a member of school staff for safe storage throughout the day

Pupils must secure their phones as much as possible, including using passwords or pin codes to protect access to the phone's functions. Staff must also secure their personal phones, as well as any work phone provided to them. Failure by staff to do so could result in data breaches.

The school accepts no responsibility for mobile phones that are lost, damaged or stolen on school premises or transport, during school visits or trips, or while pupils are travelling to and from school.

A copy of this policy will be shared with all parents to ensure they understand the rules around phone use and the disclaimer.

Confiscated phones will be stored in the Assistant Head (DSL's) office in a locked cabinet.

Lost phones should be returned to [Assistant Head teacher]. The school will then attempt to contact the owner.

# 7. Monitoring and review

The school is committed to ensuring that this policy has a positive impact of pupils' education, behaviour and welfare. When reviewing the policy, the school will take into account:

- > Feedback from parents and pupils
- > Feedback from teachers
- > Records of behaviour and safeguarding incidents
- > Relevant advice from the Department for Education, the local authority or other relevant organisations

## 8. Appendix 1: Acceptable use agreement for pupils

#### Acceptable use agreement

You must obey the following rules if you bring your mobile phone to school:

- 1. You must hand your phone in at the school gate on arrival at school.
- 2. Phones must be switched off (not just put on 'silent').
- 3. Avoid sharing your contact details with people you don't know, and don't share other people's contact details without their consent.
- 4. Don't share your phone's passwords or access codes with anyone else.
- 5. Don't use your mobile phone to bully, intimidate or harass anyone in or outside of school. This includes bullying, harassing or intimidating pupils or staff via:
  - a. Email
  - b. Text/messaging app
  - c. Social media
- 6. Don't use your phone to send or receive anything that may be criminal. For instance, by 'sexting'.
- 7. Rules on bullying, harassment, and intimidation apply to how you use your mobile phone even when you aren't in school.
- 8. Don't use vulgar, obscene or derogatory language while on the phone or when using social media. This language is not permitted under the school's behaviour policy.
- 9. Don't use your phone to view or share pornography or other harmful content.
- 10. You must comply with a request by a member of staff to switch off, or hand over, a phone. Refusal to comply is a breach of the school's behaviour policy and will be dealt with accordingly.
- 11. Mobile phones are not permitted in any internal or external exam or test environment. If you have a mobile phone, you will be asked to store these appropriately, or turn them over to an exam invigilator, before entering the test room. Bringing a phone into the test room can result in your exam being declared invalid.

#### 9. Appendix 4: Mobile phone information slip for visitors

### Use of mobile phones in our school

- > Please keep your mobile phone on silent/vibrate while on the school grounds preferably in your car.
- > Please do not use phones where pupils are present. If you must use your phone, you may go to the kitchen in Oak Farm House
- > Do not take photos or recordings of pupils (unless it is your own child), or staff
- > Do not use your phone in lessons, or when working with pupils

The school accepts no responsibility for phones that are lost, damaged or stolen while you are on the school grounds.

A full copy of our mobile phone policy is available from the school office.

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
